We Hear God's Word

First Lesson: Genesis 50:15-21

Reader: A reading from the book of Genesis.

Realizing that their father was dead, Joseph's brothers said, "What if Joseph still bears a grudge against us and pays us back in full for all the wrong that we did to him?" So they approached Joseph, saying, "Your father gave this instruction before he died, 'Say to Joseph: I beg you, forgive the crime of your brothers and the wrong they did in harming you.' Now therefore please forgive the crime of the servants of the God of your father." Joseph wept when they spoke to him. Then his brothers also wept, fell down before him, and said, "We are here as your slaves." But Joseph said to them, "Do not be afraid! Am I in the place of God? Even though you intended to do harm to me, God intended it for good, in order to preserve a numerous people, as he is doing today. So have no fear; I myself will provide for you and your little ones." In this way he reassured them, speaking kindly to them.

Reader: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

People: **Thanks be to God.**

Second Lesson: Romans 14:1-12

Reader: A reading from the book of Romans.

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God.

We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. For it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God." So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

Sermon

The Rev. Bob Wickizer

Me versus Us

I would like to start today with a Jewish concept that arose in the second century after Jesus, so it is not part of Christian faith, but it is important to modern-day Jewish practice. This is the idea of "*tikkun olam*" or the healing of the world. The concept is described by some as the "aspiration to behave and act constructively and beneficially." Accordingly, I have titled this sermon, "Me versus Us."

Two broad themes have emerged in my thinking about the challenges we face. One you have heard a lot from me over the years about the personal versus the corporate, about "my rights versus our rights" and about individual salvation versus corporate salvation. The personalization

of the Christian faith by evangelicals in the 19th century has produced a bizarre fusion of cherry-picked Christian doctrine with political ideology that focuses exclusively on personal salvation over and above all other teachings of Jesus and basic morality.

This package of exclusively personal religion is spread and multiplied by making people afraid. Some churches preach that true believers should welcome political unrest, wars and climate change because then, their saved believers will see Jesus even sooner. Nothing else matters for the members of the personal Jesus club. The world can go to hell. All that matters is their personal salvation.

It is hard to determine which came first, personalized, fear-based religion or personalized, fear-based politics. In the political arena we make people afraid of each other. We make the idea of “my individual rights” supreme over the rights of the group. For example, my right to own riverside property and pollute the river is more important than your right for safe, clean water downstream. At this point, I must remind you that Jesus tells us more than forty times in the bible, “Do not fear.” It would seem then, that making people afraid in politics or religion does not abide by the teachings of Jesus.

In addition, the last six words of the pledge of allegiance are “With liberty and justice for all.” Not liberty and justice for me. Not liberty and justice for you. But liberty and justice for everyone. Fear-based personalization in religion and politics is neither helpful nor Christian.

So where does that leave us regarding healing of the world? This second part is new to me. What I am going to share with you represents a change of my thinking. This has been working on me since I was 23, and I tossed my unfinished Ph.D. dissertation in the trash telling my thesis advisor that “getting a Ph.D. in physics wasn’t my calling.” After forty-five years, you can call me a slow learner, but here it is.

The scientific method is taught to junior high students. Observe the world. Create your hypothesis. Design the experiment. Build a mathematical model. Get the data. See how the data fits your hypothesis. Spin. Repeat. But underlying this whole enterprise is a methodological assumption. Philosophers call it “reductionism,” that is, you can take a complex system, tear it apart into pieces. Describe the pieces and you understand the whole.

We have allowed this reductionist thinking to creep into our political, social, and religious systems in a way that we don’t even question the underlying problem. As a result, we have one group working on climate change, another on racism, another on income inequality, another on energy, another on healthcare, another on education, another on immigration, another on religion that never gets political, another on politics that uses religion like a puppet, another on international relations, and another on the military. Each group takes its own problem domain, tears it apart and finds solutions to problems. None of the groups talk to each other.

What’s worse is that people believe we are making progress in all these areas. Because our approaches are compartmentalized and our religio-politics are personalized and fear-based, each person can claim no responsibility or involvement in systemic racism, income inequality worldwide, melting glaciers in Greenland, fires in California or political unrest in developing countries. Reductionism and compartmentalism give ALL OF US an easy out. “Not my problem,” we say.

The problem is that these challenges belong to ALL OF US. Each one of us is complicit and responsible in some way for the state of the world. If you are breathing, then you are responsible. We cannot point our fingers at others. We cannot write off the problems of the world as political or as liberal or conservative. We cannot write off the problems as belonging to someone else to fix. We cannot blame the other political party.

It all starts with a change of our heart and our mind. This kind of change is called “repentance.” Jesus told us very clearly in Luke 13, “Unless you ALL repent, you ALL will perish.” It is time for us to begin the process of repentance. We need to look up to heaven and say, “God, I am part of the mess on this planet. I am part of the problem. Please forgive me. Help me make the world a better place.”

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
