We Hear God's Word

First Lesson: Isaiah 25:1-9 Please remain seated.

Reader: A reading from the book of Isaiah.

> O LORD, you are my God; I will exalt you, I will praise your name; for you have done wonderful things, plans formed of old, faithful and sure. For you have made the city a heap, the fortified city a ruin; the palace of aliens is a city no more, it will never be rebuilt.

> Therefore strong peoples will glorify you; cities of ruthless nations will fear you. For you have been a refuge to the poor, a refuge to the needy in their distress, a shelter from the rainstorm and a shade from the heat.

> When the blast of the ruthless was like a winter rainstorm, the noise of aliens like heat in a dry place, you subdued the heat with the shade of clouds: the song of the ruthless was stilled. On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-aged wines strained clear.

> And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; he will swallow up death forever. Then the Lord God will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the LORD has spoken. It will be said on that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the LORD for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation.

Reader: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

> Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God. which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

> Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure. whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. > Once more Jesus spoke to the people in parables, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. Again he sent other slaves, saying, 'Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet.' But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his slaves, mistreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his slaves, 'The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet.' Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests.

> "But when the king came in to see the quests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, and he said to him, 'Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?' And he was speechless. Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' For many are called, but few are chosen."

Reader: Alleluia! Alleluia! Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful people and kindle in them the

Sermon: The Rev. Bob Wickizer

Please be seated.

It is all a matter of love

It may be a bit ironic that I write this sermon from Moab, Utah which was named for the biblical tribe of Moabites. If you look at the history, this is not a flattering name. The Moabite tribe is related to the Israelites shortly after the exodus. After the towns of Sodom and Gomorrah were destroyed for their sinfulness, Abraham's nephew, Lot had two sons Ammon and Moab who had children with their sisters. The Moabite tribe is descended from that unhappy union. The Moabites worshiped a pagan fish-god and were in frequent conflict with the Israelites.

The Moabites may be one of the ruthless nations or ruthless warriors our prophet Isaiah mentions today. This section of Isaiah is set in a context before the exile. The prophet is holding up ruthless enemies of Israel perhaps as examples of the corrupt and selfish rulers of Israel under whom the common people were suffering at the time. Later, Isaiah will claim that the exile and deportation of the leaders of Israel was directly caused by their sinfulness.

In addition to celebrating St. Francis today and the blessing of the animals, we could call today's lectionary readings "Banquet Sunday" because Isaiah, Psalm 23 and Matthew all deal with banquets. We need to ask, if the people are suffering under unjust rule, what is the point of a banquet?

Let me answer the question first, and then we will circle back to the specifics. These banquets in all three lessons are "eschatological." They are staged at the end of time when God makes all things right. When the poor and the downtrodden are lifted up. When justice rolls like a mighty river. When the ruthless rulers are sent away empty. When the sheep and goats are separated. When the shroud that is cast over the people is destroyed. When God has done wonderful things fulfilling God's plans for all of God's people. This is when the banquet takes place.

Who is invited to the banquet at the end of time? On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-aged wines strained clear. It may seem confusing that Isaiah mentions God as subduing the ruthless and the aliens while emphasizing that "all peoples" will come to the banquet. I think that "all people" of God means the people who follow the commandments, who try to do God's will in all things, who are fair and just in their dealings with others, and who know that after all they try to do right, they still come up short.

Whether you look at people in 500 BC, in Jesus' day, or today, in the 21st century, you will find faithful people trying to do the right thing but missing the mark from time to time. When we fail to do the right thing, we are in need of God's forgiveness and mercy. This is the constant thing about people for the past 3,000 years or more.

Who are the "ruthless" in Isaiah's vision, the "enemies" in Psalm 23, and the bozo who shows up without a wedding robe in Matthew's banquet? These are the people who do not even try to do the right thing. They care only about themselves. They do not practice the Golden Rule. When they are rulers, they oppress the people. When they are merchants, they cheat people by dishonest means. You find them from beginning to end of the bible. You find them in society today. They do not pray to God. They do not acknowledge their own shortcomings. They do not depend upon God for mercy and forgiveness. Life begins and ends with their own selfish needs.

These are the people who do not attend the banquet. In a parable of Jesus, they have already "received their reward." So, what is the point of this banquet at the end of time?

It gives hope and we affirm that God is in charge. There will be a judgment. There will be a reversal. There will be a banquet for ALL of God's people. We are hopeful because we believe in a God of mercy, forgiveness and justice. And we wait, actively, trying our best to bring God's mercy, justice and love into the world.

Francis was born into a life of wealth and luxury. Known for his partying and drinking in his youth, he volunteered for military service, was captured in battle, and spent a year in prison waiting for his father to find him and pay ransom. During his time in prison, Francis received visions from God to repair his church and live a life of poverty.

My sister-in-law has been a Franciscan nun for sixty years. Recently, she wrote to me saying that "life now and in the hereafter is a matter of love." We might take our cue from the Lord's Prayer, "Your will be done, on earth, as it is in heaven." God wants us to love others, especially our enemies and especially those who are NOT invited to the banquet. Francis taught that and lived it fully.

I don't know about you, but lately, I have had a very difficult time feeling the love. As I reflected on that, looking out at the mountains in Moab, I understood my error.

In marriage counseling, I always tell couples young and old that love is not a feeling, it is a choice. It is a commitment. Loving other people is a choice you make every day, every hour of the day to smile, to give someone the benefit of the doubt, to understand their point of view, to learn their fears and their hopes, to share what you have in common. You do this with your spouse and your children. You do this with your friends. Being faithful and being truly Christian is to make this commitment to love with EVERYONE.

Being invited to the banquet is all about you making that commitment to love others no matter what. With no conditions or exceptions, no matter what. The question Isaiah, Jesus and Francis pose to you today is, "Will you make a commitment to love ALL others as much as yourself?"


