## We Gather

We are entering the last few weeks of the long church season of Pentecost. Advent begins a new church year in three weeks. Our readings today include a farewell speech from Joshua who brought the Israelites across the Jordan into the promised land which happened to be occupied by the Canaanites. He begins his discourse in a strange way. 1400 years later, Jesus teaches about the kingdom of heaven with the parable of the bridesmaids. There is a connection, so stay tuned.

## We Hear God's Word

First Lesson: Joshua 24:1-3a, 14-25

Please remain seated.

Reader:

A reading from the book of Joshua.

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem, and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel: Long ago your ancestors—Terah and his sons Abraham and Nahor—lived beyond the Euphrates and served other gods. Then I took your father Abraham from beyond the River and led him through all the land of Canaan and made his offspring many.

"Now therefore revere the LORD, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the LORD. Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD."

Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the LORD to serve other gods; for it is the LORD our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; and the LORD drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God."

But Joshua said to the people, "You cannot serve the LORD, for he is a holy God. He is a jealous God; he will not forgive your transgressions or your sins. If you forsake the LORD and serve foreign gods, then he will turn and do you harm, and consume you, after having done you good." And the people said to Joshua, "No, we will serve the LORD!" Then Joshua said to the people, "You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen the LORD, to serve him." And they said, "We are witnesses." He said, "Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your hearts to the LORD, the God of Israel." The people said to Joshua, "The LORD our God we will serve, and him we will obey." So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and made statutes and ordinances for them at Shechem.

## Second Lesson: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

Reader: A reading from the book of Thessalonians

> We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

> Jesus said, "Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' And while they went

to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

Sermon: The Rev. Bob Wickizer

Please be seated.

Choose this day whom you will serve

Today we live during an in-between time. Between the national election this week and our national holiday of Thanksgiving a few weeks from now. We live between the beginning and the end of the Coronavirus pandemic. We live in uncertain times – uncertain about our health, uncertain about the fate of our nation, uncertain whether humans today will doom the fate of the next century with anthropogenic warming, uncertain whether our children will see opportunities and economic prosperity as much as we have enjoyed so far.

We gather together in our collective faith of a God of grace and mercy. We gather in hope that no matter what blunders lie ahead, the God of mercy will forgive us and offer sanctuary. We gather in fear and trembling that maybe we haven't dedicated ourselves to God 100%, that perhaps we have hedged our bets serving other, lesser gods along the way.

We are not much different than the Israelites who fled Pharaoh's chariots in Egypt, wandered in the desert for 40 years, crossed the Jordan with their new leader, Joshua, and who now are gathered at an ancient city to hear Joshua's farewell speech. This takes place three or four centuries before David sets up Jerusalem about forty miles south as the center of Jewish worship.

Shechem – the name in Hebrew means "shoulder" indicating the fertile valley between Mt. Gerazim to the north and Mt. Ebal to the south. The site had been occupied by various peoples for several thousand years prior to Joshua's speech. It was a natural crossroads north and south from Galilee through Shechem in Samaria to Judah where Jerusalem is located. And east and west from the Assyrian kingdom east of the Jordan down the coast on the way of the patriarchs to Egypt.

This is where Jesus, about 1400 years AFTER Joshua's speech today, will talk to a Samaritan woman at Jacob's well about her ancestors who worshiped at the temple the Samaritans had built on Mt. Gerazim but was destroyed by zealous Jews from Jerusalem about 150 years before Jesus. Shechem is in the middle of Samaria. The Samaritans were hated by the Jews and considered to be half-Jewish apostates. This is why Jesus teaches the parable of the Good Samaritan because no respectable Jew of his day would ever consider a Samaritan "good" in any respect.

There is an ancient religious history to this site. Centuries before Joshua, the patriarch of the Israelites was Abram who traveled south through the land of Canaan passing through Shechem where he encountered the sacred oak tree at Moreh better translated as the terebinth tree of the teacher – a place of divine oracles. Abram encountered the word of God there. For centuries before this encounter, people believed that divine spirits lived in trees. Moses' encounter with the burning bush is an example of this belief.

Shechem was a sanctuary city meaning that if you killed a person in Galilee, Samaria or Judah, you could flee to Shechem and your life would be spared from your avenger. This was also the city set aside by later Jews in Jerusalem for the temple priests of the Levite and Cohen tribes.

Joshua begins his farewell speech reminding the Israelites that their ancestor, Abram, the father of the Jewish people, and his father, Terah, served other gods. From this humble beginning, he notes that whatever good the people have is not something they have done by themselves. God did it. God saved them from the Egyptians, preserved them, brought them to this day and gave them a land on which they had not labored, cities which they had not built, and vineyards which they did not plant. God brought them from their pagan past to move them into a land of milk and honey for which they had done nothing to deserve.

Could this be our story today? That God has brought us to this day, and for the most part, we enjoy many blessings which we have done nothing to deserve? That we and our ancestors have never really been 100% faithful to God? That we stray from time to time like lost sheep, worshiping the gods of money, power, security, health and social position?

By the way, that idea of being 100% faithful to God takes us to Jesus' conversation with the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well near Shechem. "But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth..." A better translation for the word "truth" here takes us back to the Hebrew scriptures where it means "reliably." In other words, God is 100% reliable and faithful to us. We try to worship God and give thanks for what we have and who we are in a 100% reliable way. That is "spirit and truth."

Joshua challenges the Israelites three times to choose the God of Israel who brought Abram by faith out of the land of Ur of the Chaldeans. "Choose this day whom you will serve" he thunders. The God who gives us life, preserves us and brings us to this day? Or the lesser gods we all lean on just in case?

God does not expect us to be 100% reliable. We are expected to try. Maybe some of us are 80%, others are 50%. In every case, the God of mercy will forgive us and welcome us home. The good news in all this is that we are not forced to choose which god we will serve. We have a choice. We make that choice every hour of every day in every life decision big and small.

Jesus' parable of the bridesmaids encourages us to keep awake, to be alert every time we choose which god to serve. Making a choice one time is never enough because we encounter the lesser gods every day in every moment. I pray that we will all make the right choice at least most of the time.
