

# **Advent Candle Lighting**


Reader 1 According to tradition, each candle has a special meaning. The first one, usually purple, is called the candle of hope. People in the Old Testament knew that God had promised to send a Savior. And we're filled with hope because we know that Jesus came to Earth on the first Christmas so he could tell people about God and die for our sins. As we get ready to light the first candle on our Advent wreath, let us listen to a reading from Romans.

Reader 2: I pray that God, the source of hope, will fill you completely with joy and peace because you trust in him. Then you will overflow with confident hope through the power of the Holy Spirit. Romans 15:13.

Sharing: Share some ways that you're filled with hope because you know Jesus or how Jesus makes a difference in your lives. **Amen**.

After sharing, the first blue candle is lit and all say,

People: One candle, burning bright, Chasing away the darkness for light One candle, glowing light, The blessing of God, giving new sight.



### Introduction

Celebrant: Welcome to the first Sunday in Advent online. For public safety, we have closed our doors for public access to in-person worship. But we are here with you online, in prayer and in spirit.

The church begins its new worship year today on Advent 1. The word "advent" is Latin meaning "the coming." It refers not only to the birth of Jesus celebrated at Christmas but to the second coming of Christ in judgment. For the next four weeks, we will have these end of the world readings because that is when Christ returns in judgment.

Let us reach out to each other as best we can to dispel the darkness. Let us remind each other of the goodness that is in us.

And let us support and be a blessing as we battle the isolation with online encounters, the telephone, and good old fashioned letters.



### We Hear God's Word

### First Lesson: Isaiah 64:1-9

Please be seated.

Reader: A reading from the book of Isaiah.

> O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence!

> When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him.

You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth.

We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away. There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.

Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity forever. Now consider, we are all your people.

Reader: The word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.


## Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 1:3-9

*Reader:* A reading from Apostle Paul's letter to the Corinthians.

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind - just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you-- so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Reader: The word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.



Gospel: Mark 13:24-37

Please stand.

Reader: The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "In those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

"From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

"But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake - for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."

# Gratitude and Hopefulness

Sometimes in the life of a preacher, we need to consider the secular events and the needs of the people more so than the demands of scripture in the lectionary. One such occasion was September 16, 2001, five days after the World Trade Center. Today is the first Sunday in Advent. Our theme in the readings is hopefulness, but we are in the middle of a global pandemic, and frankly, the statistics in the spread of this disease are very discouraging right now.

One of my responsibilities as your priest is to be your cheerleader. Not to serve as a comedian or Pollyanna, but to help you see the goodness in God's beautiful world, amid anxiety, suffering and even despair. We are all sick and tired of being cooped up and isolated. Whatever we had as a "normal" life before has been tossed into a cosmic blender. Everything has gone helter-skelter. There is no more "normal." People are depressed and fearful. Young and old could die from exposure to this thing. Going to Walmart has become a game of Russian Roulette.

Lately, my role as cheerleader for you reminds me of the 1998 Italian comedy-drama, "Life is Beautiful," where a father and son are imprisoned in a Nazi concentration camp. The father attempts to shield his son from the horrors all around by comedy, uplifting narrative and love brought from a well of despair. While I cannot shield you from the world around us, I can lift you up and point you in directions that will bring you life, health, wholeness, and beauty. That is my job today.

This week, we tried to celebrate the national holiday of Thanksgiving. The holiday commemorates a disastrous time early in the European arrival to North America. In September, 1620, a hundred or so Puritans set sail from England. After a harsh first winter, half of the colonists died. Only four adult women lived through the first winter. The local Wampanoag tribe had observed this shrinking colony closely for a year and by the following fall, they showed up in the settlement with a feast of venison, turkey, shellfish and vegetables. The feast was a harvest festival, a time to fatten up before winter, and a recognition from compassion of the suffering of these hundred souls who now numbered about fifty. The colonists were starving. The Native Wampanoags fed them and gave them hope.

Thanksgiving and hope are the twin virtues born out of love and compassion. Paul's first letter to his church in Corinth reflects my thanksgiving here as well, "I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind." I have seen your love for one another, and I have witnessed your compassion in this community. What we need to do now is give birth to thanksgiving and hope because in these dark times it is way too easy to fall into the despair and self-pity that we find in the readings from Isaiah and the psalm.

Hear the lament of the Israelites who understood that their exile to Babylon was God's punishment for their sinfulness.

But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed.

We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away.

for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.

You can almost envision the rabbis shaking their fist at God in the psalm.

O LORD God of hosts, how long will you be angered despite the prayers of your people?

You have fed them with the bread of tears; you have given them bowls of tears to drink.

You have made us the derision of our neighbors, and our enemies laugh us to scorn.

And there are times today when we want to join those Israelites so long ago. We want to shake our fist at God and ask, "How long O Lord, will you be angered despite the prayers of your people?"

The statistics of our present troubles show that we may have two or three difficult months ahead of us. Winter will be upon us soon and it may be impossible to dispel the darkness with holiday cheer. What can we do besides lament and fear the disease?

I have a suggestion, and it's going to cost you about fifty cents a week. Do this for twelve weeks and it will literally rewire your brain. Your soul will be uplifted. By the time Lent rolls around, you will be able to praise God with your whole being. You can stand up tall and encourage others. You will be a witness to the power of God for all those around you.

Lest you think I am just puffing you up with a lot of religious nonsense, this activity was studied at the University of California – Berkeley. Functional MRI scanning was used to demonstrate changes in the way the same person processed emotional information. Psychologists with standardized tests showed that the study group had improved measurably. This is something you can easily do for fifty cents and a little bit of time every week. Do you want to give this a try?

I know this is a virtual online service, so I am hoping you are out there saying "amen" to this question. "Let's do it."

Here's what you need to do. Pick someone from the parish address book or someone else you know. Write a letter to them giving them praise and thanksgiving for specific things about them that you notice. Do NOT use any negative emotions and do NOT use the words "we" or "us." Your thanksgiving letter should use all "I" or "you" statements. It is about your sense of gratitude.

You can decide whether or not you want to mail the letter later. Sometimes you will and sometimes you won't. That's ok. The point is that you wrote the letter. Do this for twelve weeks and you will be a changed person. Maybe next spring, we can all get together and write our own psalm of praise and thanksgiving to God.

Three months and you will be changed. Three months and the power of God working in you will do far more than you can ever ask or imagine.

Silence for reflection after the sermon.

### The Nicene Creed

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.
