Second Lesson: Ephesians 3:1-12

Reader: A reading from the book of Ephesians.

This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles-- for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Reader: The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Sermon

Shining Forth

Celebrant: On September 11, 2001, I was in the National Cathedral meeting with my bishop when the third airplane crashed into the Pentagon. Security interrupted our meeting and evacuated the three hundred staff and visitors to the south lawn of the cathedral. From that high point on that clear, September morning, a chill went down my spine as we looked across the Potomac River at the Pentagon burning in the distance.

I had a kind of vision or epiphany in that moment. I saw two, very different possible futures. In the first vision which I have named "The Dream of God", America and Europe grappled realistically with how the Muslim world has been treated by the west. A grand, revitalization plan was launched like the post-WWII Marshall Plan but bigger. It was a John Lennon "dreamer" kind of vision, but peace prevailed, and the world was better.

The other vision, more "realistic" some would say, was much darker with endless warfare, food scarcity and disease. In these past twenty years, the world has at least racked up two out of three of those. I am not sure we are any better now than in 2001.

I began writing this sermon at the end of the day on Wednesday this week, the actual day of Epiphany as well as the day of violence, mayhem and murder in our capitol. I did not have any visions this time, but that same chill and sinking feeling set in as I watched the news of this sad day. I turned off the television and read the scriptures preparing to write this sermon.

God incarnate, the baby Jesus, was born into a world filled with political violence, mayhem, and murder. Not long after Jesus is born, wise men or "magi" from the east arrive in Jerusalem where they ask King Herod who is the king of the Jews, where they might find this baby who has been born king of the Jews. Look what Matthew's gospel says happens net. When Herod heard about this baby who is the king of the Jews, he is frightened. But the gospel says more. Not only is Herod frightened, but "all Jerusalem with him."

Who else might be frightened to learn that Herod's position was being contested by a newborn baby? Certainly not all the peasants he oppressed and taxed to death. Certainly not the occupying Roman military. The only people who would also be frightened by this news are those who benefit in some way by their relationship to the king. They benefit by getting the best jobs, political favors, money, family connections and so on. A new king, even a baby, would be bad for their business.

The magi could see right through Herod's plot. "Let me know where you find the baby so that I can go pay homage." Bull. Herod wants to eliminate his competition. Failing to learn where the baby Jesus is staying, Herod later has all the baby boys in Jerusalem murdered. The Holy Family learned of this plot from an angel and fled to Egypt where they stay until the crazy King Herod dies.

The story so many years ago was repeated this week. Resort to violence, mayhem, and murder all while playing the game, "who gets to be king." This week we witnessed the stark difference between the Dream of God and the desires of man.

After all, who doesn't want to be king of the mountain with all the money and power to do whatever you want? Isn't that grand? I have watched people move into kingly roles in business and academia. A few of them manage to convince themselves that they deserve the top role; even those who inherited it. Money, power, and control are all human addictions that isolate us from the one inescapable fact – that we will die someday.

The dream of God is very different from the follies of humanity. God's dream starts humbly with a baby born to peasant parents in a backwater town. God's king is described in the psalm. "That he may rule the poor with justice... He shall defend the needy...rescue the poor and crush the oppressor...and there shall be an abundance of peace." My first vision while watching the Pentagon smolder was like this description.

We believe that some part of the resurrected Christ lives in each one of us. We remind ourselves of this when we receive the body and blood of Christ. Christ dwells in us and we dwell in Christ. We are to carry out his mission in the world. Epiphany is sometimes called the season of light. You should seriously consider that you bring the light of Christ into the world.

We carry the light of Christ, shining out from each one of us when we call people and check on them, when we write cards and letters, when we visit them, when we show kindness to strangers, when we use the church facilities to help others, when we volunteer for non-profits, even when we smile.

There are also ways we can extinguish that light of Christ within us. We turn out the light when we judge other people, when we gossip, when we don't listen to people, when we don't value others. All these actions snuff out the Christ in us and send us back into the sad game of king of the mountain.

The light of Christ came into the world to save us from ourselves. You have part of that light now. It is your job to share the light you have and brighten up the world. And if your love and light stops just one king of the mountain game, then you are a blessing.






