Introduction:

Celebrant: Welcome to the fourth Sunday of Epiphany at Grace Episcopal Church in Muskogee Oklahoma.

Because today is our parish annual meeting, we have taken some liberties with the readings and music today to help reinforce the idea that this church and ALL churches after this pandemic subsides will necessarily become mission-focused if not just plain old missions. Our lives in church will encompass two different activities – one is the work we do out there in the world for others. We do the work of Jesus in the world whether we are a schoolteacher, stay-at-home-mom, lawyer or Meals On Wings driver. The other activity is coming back together at church on Sunday morning to recharge our spiritual and social batteries.

Sermon

Get on the Bus

In the Episcopal Church, the preacher is allowed to completely change the readings for a given Sunday in the event of important milestones for the parish. This is to be the rare exception and today is one of those exceptions. For too many years on "annual meeting Sunday" we have looked backwards at the year behind us and patted ourselves on the back for good work, but no longer.

Last year was a dumpster fire we would all like to forget. Today we must look forward to the year 2021 and to the many years ahead. Today we must hear again God's call to every man, woman, and child in this parish. Today we must be inspired (that is, filled with the Spirit). Today we must be enthused (that is to be filled with God). Today we must recommit ourselves to serving as the heart and hands of Jesus. Today, we must direct our vision from maintenance of what is past to mission for what lies ahead.

The first stop on our journey is inspiration. You can spend hours on the Internet watching

inspiring videos of people with no legs climbing mountains, of children starting social movements and successful non-profits, and of animals doing incredible things to return to their families. But most of us are not very young, we still have our legs, and we are not eagles, chickens or bunnies. Consider the Bible. Abram was seventy-five years old when God called



him and told him to GO to Haran. His wife was no spring chicken either. But they went. Former president, Jimmy Carter, is 96 and is still building Habitat for Humanity houses.

In 1546 Michelangelo thought he had done it all. In despair he felt like his life was over. He planned to move back to Florence and retire at 71. Then the pope asked him to oversee the

construction of St. Peter's Basilica at the Vatican. Michelangelo was a self-taught architect. He knew that Bramante and later architects had been a disaster for this project. Reluctantly he accepted the job. The first thing he discovered was that there was rampant corruption, cronyism, lack of accounting, funds going everywhere except into the



building, and that forty years of construction was substandard and had to be demolished and started over. Can you imagine going to the pope after a few months on the job and giving that bad news?

Michelangelo spent the next eighteen years of his life building the largest and most complicated project ever. When he died at 89, St. Peter's Basilica was not completed until 62 years later. Today, it is a masterpiece. The moral of these stories is: It's never too late to start and none of us is too old for God's dream.

Our second stop is enthusiasm; literally to be filled with God. Who cannot forget Isaiah's vision in chapter six where the angels and seraphs are flying around God's

throne? A coal is placed on Isaiah's mouth to purify it. Out of this mystical vision, God thunders, "Whom shall I send? Who will go for us?" I imagine this scene where Isaiah wakes into the world where he has been asleep. He stands, looks up at the heavens and shouts, "Here am I; send me!"

In this passage, Isaiah was filled with the glory of God. Just before this verse, the angels sing "Holy, Holy, Holy..." from which we get our Sanctus. But sometimes, it works in reverse. Sometimes you must move ahead and

go. You step out in faith. When you arrive at the next stop on your mission, God will fill you up there.

Our third stop requires us to recommit and rededicate ourselves to the ministries God gives us.

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Father?

People: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

- Celebrant: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?
- People: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.
- Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?
- *People:* I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.
- *Celebrant:* Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?

People: I will, with God's help.

- *Celebrant:* Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?
- People: I will, with God's help.
- Celebrant: Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?
- People: I will, with God's help.
- Celebrant: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?
- People: I will, with God's help.
- *Celebrant:* Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

People: I will, with God's help.

Finally, we must look forward. Within a few weeks, this church will open its doors again for in-person worship. Yes, we have lost people for various reasons. Yes, our budget is an enormous challenge. But we are the faithful remnant. We are determined to be a continuing force for good in this community. We are strong. We are smart. And we are creative. We will do what it takes to keep this bus moving down the road.



And down the road we must go. To building a refreshing green space for rest on the corner. To opening our parking lot and parish hall for after school programs. To classes for conflict management, parenting and financial management for adults. To a welcoming social environment where our bonds of friendship reflect the love of Christ. We don't believe in guilt. We try hard to welcome and not to



judge. And we go back to the table every Sunday where we are reminded that we belong to God and we raise up the best in every human being.

God may ask some of you to do new things in the weeks and months ahead. Some of you may respond with a reluctant "yes" like Michelangelo. Others may respond enthusiastically like Isaiah. However you respond to God's call, you must move your feet and get on the bus.
