



We Hear God's Word

First Lesson: Numbers 21:4-9

Please be seated.

Reader: A reading from the book of Numbers.

From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the LORD sent poisonous mserpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the LORD said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Reader: A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Ephesians.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

You were dead through the trespasses and sins in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

Gospel: John 3:14-21 Please Remain standing.

Reader: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Jesus said, "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

Sermon: Divine Evolution The Rev Bob Wickizer

John 3:16 comes up on our Lenten readings every year. Apparently, somebody high up in the ecclesiastical hierarchy thinks it is important for us to hear, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest this scripture. Of course, you can see it plastered on billboards and bumper stickers everywhere, but what does it really mean?

In previous years, we have tackled the word "eternal" as in "eternal life." $\zeta\omega\eta\nu$ αιωνιον (zoe aionion), life everlasting, that's what it's all about, right? We have probably devoted two or three sermons to this in the past. The quick takeaway in case you missed it: zoe aionion, or eternal life is not about fluttering around in heaven on wings and eating bon bons for eternity. It is a finite, righteous life lived right here and now. Life lived in Christ, in the Holy Spirit, to the fullest. At times, it can be a puzzling life because you may not know if you are on the good side of things or not. It is a life well-lived and worth remembering and passing on to your loved ones.

John 3:16 comes with a guarantee, that those who have faith in God's peerless son, MAY NOT PERISH. It is those words to which we need to turn our attention today. To understand this, we need to deep dive to the ancient world of Greek philosophy in 500 BC, to the Mycenean culture a thousand years before that, and possibly the Minoan culture even earlier. Important words often have a long, cultural usage. Our modern understanding of a translated term often takes us down the wrong rabbit hole.

For example, in our Hebrew Bible reading from the Book of Numbers which is quoted in John, God makes poisonous snakes to bite and kill the Israelites who rebelled against God. I have always thought this was at best a very unflattering understanding of a god who sends snakes to kill people. In trying to understand that, I need to know who or what is the agent causing the destruction and death? For what reasons or purposes? And what is the downstream result of such destruction?

The ancient world view believed that some ruling class of gods or people, or some status quo about the way things are in the world, was what held back the formation of better and greater things. I imagine this as a kind of "divine evolution." Here are some examples of this concept:

- Modern birds are the direct descendants of dinosaurs. Birds could never have evolved if most of the
 dinosaurs had not been wiped out by a comet strike 65 million years ago. This is an example of the
 status quo (dinosaurs), holding back the formation of something better (birds). Besides, I like birds
 much better than T-rex.
- The rebuilding of Jerusalem after Babylon was conquered by Cyrus of Persia is an example of a ruling class of people under Nebuchadnezzar holding back the development of a better Judaism
- The rise of the modern world after the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70AD

The defeat or destruction of the earlier thing is not accomplished by what comes after. The ancients believed that only divine messengers, angels, intervened to bring about such enormous changes. This understanding of who, what, how and why destruction occurs was in place in the Ancient Near East long before Judaism or Christianity. When John uses the words, "shall not perish," it comes loaded with these ancient understandings. In other words, the destruction is part of God's plan and represents a progression towards better things.

The world will not remember or honor the things that are past, that were wiped out or did not contribute in a positive way to the future. Remember the movie "Amadeus"? It starts out with a contemporary of Mozart named Salieri. No one remembers Salieri or his compositions today, but Mozart? Yes.

These ideas of the meanings of eternal life and perishing now take us to a different place. By having faith in the one who lived, died, and ascended to heaven, we will live in a way where we are merciful to others and we forgive others. This is to live life fully, to live in Christ, and to be as much like Christ as we can. In living like that, we are contributing in a positive way to the future, to God's plan, and to the evolution of things that are even better.

In having faith in God's peerless son, we are promised that we will not perish, that we will be part of God's perfection of the world. We are promised that the memory of us will remain after us. We are promised that our life will be honored and remembered by those who come after us. The memory of who we were and how we lived in Christ will survive long after we are gone, just like Mozart's music.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come Amen.
