
Second Lesson: Mark 16: 1-8

Sermon

Fake News or Good News?

Alleluia, Christ is Risen! (The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!)

I want to start this morning with a story from an old hunting buddy who also loved Labrador retrievers. One spring morning, my friend rose early to find his dog on the patio covered in dirt with a rabbit in his mouth. The rabbit wasn't bloody, just dirty. His neighbor's kids raised blue ribbon rabbits they proudly entered in the county fair each year. He knew the rabbit must have come from next door.

He took the rabbit away from the dog. Labs, by the way, are trained not to chomp on or chew up the game they retrieve. He grabbed a hose and washed all the dirt off. The neighbors were away but he knew they were returning Sunday afternoon. This guy is kind of clueless and he remembered that some animals play dead. He was hoping rabbits were in that category. Quickly, he took the wet but clean bunny and put it back in the cage in his neighbors' back yard.

That afternoon, they arrived home. Soon after, my friend heard his neighbor's children AND their parents screaming. My friend goes through the gate to ask what's wrong. They said their rabbit died three days ago and they buried it, but now, it's back in the cage.

The field of epistemology is all about knowing things—about what we know, and more importantly, HOW we know. As you can tell from the story, what we know can also depend upon our point of view and how we come to know certain things. The distinction between fake news and real news is one of epistemology. Modern detractors of Christian belief would say the story of the resurrection is "fake news." Today I want to rescue our belief from the naysayers and give you some truly good news.

This morning we heard Mark's account of the women at the empty tomb, and then we heard the exact same story told from John's point of view. Mark's was the first gospel written around the same time Paul was writing his letters about thirty years after the crucifixion and resurrection. John, however, writes almost thirty years AFTER Mark, or about sixty years after the resurrection.

A lot of history passed under the bridge between Mark and John. During Mark's writings, the early church was flourishing and expanding rapidly. Christians worshipped in Jewish synagogues as a religious sect of Judaism that simply believed the Messiah had indeed come. The Romans tolerated the Jews and the Christians who were part of that group. Within a few years of Mark finishing his gospel, Emperor Nero blamed the Christians for the burning of Rome and began the first brutal persecution of Christians. A Jewish revolt resulted in Romans destroying Jerusalem and banishing the Jews to the countryside. By the time John writes his gospel, the relations between Christians and Jews had gone sour and Christians were no longer welcome in synagogues.

In between Mark's and John's writings, the most destructive volcano on the planet erupted about 150 miles south of Rome, killing over 30,000 residents of Pompei and Herculaneum. While this had very little political or economic impact on the vast Roman Empire, it reminded them that things they did not know were sometimes in the power of their gods to determine. Volcanos cannot be predicted or controlled.

We, modern folks, often make assumptions about the ancient minds and what they knew or believed. We imagine the ancients as dividing up knowledge into two categories: 1. Things that are known and understood by logic such as the wheels on your chariot must be the same diameter or it will never go straight. And 2. Things that cannot be understood or explained are supernatural or superstitious, belonging to the realm of religious belief. In our modern worldview, we make the same kind of mistake. We divide knowledge into the same two compartments: 1. Things that are understood by science. And 2. All other things that cannot be explained are supernatural, superstitious, or religious. It has become a popular fad among thoroughly modern people to ridicule and discount any person who holds beliefs in the second category. In their eyes, we are all a bunch of religious nutcakes believing in magic.

But there is a third category of knowledge—that there are things that will be knowable or explainable someday, but we just do not understand them today. This is actually the hinge between modern science and religion. Neither field makes a claim to perfect knowledge.

We know that at the time of Jesus, other prophets and rabbis are reported in written testimony to have performed the same miracles as Jesus did, but today, those people are minor footnotes in history. What's the difference?

We do know that SOMETHING happened. Something powerful enough that the disciples would all (except for John) die brutal deaths, and some by crucifixion. Something powerful enough that inspired and gave hope to millions of people. Believers in the resurrection would die helping other non-Christians in countless plagues and pandemics. Believers would devote their lives to helping the poor, the elderly, and the lame. Something happened that gives hope today. Something happened that is worth dying for. Something happened that brings down the powerful from their thrones and raises up the lowly.

Believing in the resurrection is not all about going to heaven. It is about taking the mission and message of Christ and making it your own. Believing that something happened means that you take the central message of God to suffering people and make it your message.

God creates you, loves you, and forgives you. To show that you understand that message, reach out and help someone else you do not know. When you do, you will give hope and meaning to a world in need of the love that only you can give.
