My praise is of God in the great assembly; [which is our gathering today] I will perform my vows in the presence of those who worship God. [As a result of this,] The poor shall eat and be satisfied, and those who seek God shall praise God.

So YOU are the great assembly gathered here and online. As a result of our praise and worship, the poor shall eat and be satisfied. Thank you for being here today. Let us begin.

First Lesson: Acts 8:26-40

Please be seated.

Reader: A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

Second Lesson: 1 John 4:7-21

Reader: A reading from the first Letter of John.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since

God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Reading: John 15:1-8

Please continue standing as you are able.

Celebrant: The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to his disciples, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

Celebrant: The Gospel of the Lord.
People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

What a wonderful gospel to preach from the perspective of a priest who also grows and makes

wine. When people learn about my work as a priest and winemaker, they often make the connection with the wedding at Cana. They will say "Oh, you make wine just like Jesus did." To which I reply, "Not exactly. He used water but I still have to use grapes."

On his way to Jerusalem and the cross with the disciples, Jesus gives them this agricultural metaphor, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower." Scholars have debated whether some quotes were actually said by Jesus. This one using grapevine pruning as the metaphor is universally accepted by scholars across the spectrum from liberal to conservative as being authentic words of Jesus.



In our six acres of vineyard, Gary and D.I. do 99% of the pruning. I have about 200 vines near my house, and I work on them from time to time. Gary gives me a refresher course on pruning every

year. My work pruning is not nearly as artistic and fast as their work on 4,200 vines, but it is therapeutic to be out there early in the morning pruning away. The goal is six shoots on each cordon, and four buds on each shoot. "Cordon" is the French word for arm. The French looked at a grapevine as a person holding her arms out to each side. The feet are planted in the soil, the trunk of the body from the legs to the torso is the vertical trunk of the grapevine, and the cordons are the arms going out in both directions.²



Every vine presents a unique set of challenges. Usually there are too many shoots and too many buds. I imagine God walking through the vineyard of humanity with shears in hand. I can hear God's footsteps just like Adam and Eve heard God walking after they had the encounter with the serpent and the apple tree. In the vineyard, God is not upset because of sin. God is just trying to make the vines produce better fruit.³



I don't make a sharp association of one shoot for each person. Instead, I imagine the shoots represent all the different possibilities in our lives for growth. There may be one person on a

cordon or there may be ten. At times I imagine God doing the pruning. At other times, I am praying about specific people and things in our parish community. Pruning can be meditative, prayerful work.⁴

A shoot growing out of the bottom of a cordon is almost never acceptable. I wonder if those sneaky shoots represent the things we do that we are not proud of and we try to hide them from others and from God. SNIP goes that shoot. The fruiting canes or shoots are ideally spaced about four inches or the separation of the knuckles on



ideally spaced about four inches or the separation of the knuckles on your fist apart on the cordon. Sometimes they are too close. Maybe one of those represents staying in Muskogee while the other represents taking that new job in Kansas City. SNIP, one possibility was just clipped off the vine.

Sometimes two shoots will emerge from the same general point on the cordon. One of them has to go, but which one? There may be three or four years of growth on a short branch coming off the cordon with a new shoot on top. Next to it might be another, pencil thin shoot sprouting right off the cordon. I see that branch coming off the vine as the things we tried in life that didn't work out. Maybe it was a failed marriage or a job that went sideways. We shed tears coming up against a future that didn't look so good. God gets out the short vine saw. A few quick strokes and that part of someone's life comes to a rapid end. Now that person can devote all their energy into the thin shoot coming directly off the vine that is Jesus. We get our energy and sustenance from Jesus and not filtered through several years of going the wrong direction.

Sometimes on a beautiful spring morning, you find an entire cordon that has no growth, no shoots, no buds, no hope. This will require radical surgery. Like John the Baptist shaking his finger at the Pharisees in Matthew, "and even now the axe is laid at the root of the tree." God saws off the entire cordon all the way back to the vertical trunk. These were people given the opportunity to abide in Christ but who chose other things such as narcissism, drug addiction, money, politics, fear, domination of others, power trips and so on. They were once part of the vine, but their fruit never ripened. Year after year the vinegrower tasted their bitter, unripe fruit and spit it out. Year after year the vinegrower said, "Give them another year." Until now.

The vinegrower gently takes a new shoot off the trunk and instead of clipping that shoot off the trunk, it is trained up on the cordon wire to become the next possibility of Jesus giving life to a whole collection of people. The new group on the new cordon might be a church like Grace. It will

take a year or two for the new shoot to become a full cordon. For the next two years as the new cordon develops, the vinegrower will wrap it around the supporting wire one and a half times tying it with vineyard tape to the wire. Each wrap is a prayer from God for the group.

This cordon supports a whole church community. Each bud on that cordon is a possible new shoot, a life flourishing and producing great fruit. Some shoots are too close or come off the bottom. But perhaps they don't get thrown into the fire but instead they become shoots on another cordon. Perhaps they hit the ground and grow roots right there where the vinegrower will transplant them to become a new vine.⁵

And sometimes, in late April of 2020 and 2021, a killing frost descends on the vineyard. Thousands of buds bursting open, new shoots and even tiny clusters of flowers that would have become fruit are frozen in a few hours before dawn. The vibrant green promise of spring is replaced by a brown pall of death. It is a frightening, depressing sight. The vinegrower hopes and prays for new life to appear on those vines. Like people, grapevines are resilient.⁶

It takes a few weeks, but slowly, the secondary buds do their work. New shoots appear unfolding tiny leaves and flowers to become this year's vintage. There will be fewer shoots and less fruit this year. A natural disaster hit the vineyard like an earthquake or flood or a deadly virus strikes a city. But the vinegrower desires life. Abundant life abiding in the vine may not mean MORE fruit. It may mean BETTER fruit, lives fully lived loving other humans the way Jesus loves us.⁷

Grace Church is a whole community growing on a cordon. We have taken our hits with frosts and disease. We have lost some shoots to pruning that were hard to see go, but we have new shoots popping up off the cordon. Our hope is for good fruit this season. I can tell you that while 2020 was a tough year and produced one third as much fruit, it was a fabulous vintage. The wine is fantastic. And the year ahead is looking to be another year of less quantity but much better quality.⁸






Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds


